Superintendent's Update: Oakfield School District's Progress and Challenges

Dear Oakfield Community,

I am pleased to share with you the latest developments within our school district, from exciting renovations to important financial matters. Oakfield's commitment to providing a top-notch educational experience remains steadfast. Here are some key updates:

****Celebrations****

1. Middle School/High School Renovation: The renovation at our middle school/high school is nearly complete. The final touches include the soffit and front entrance flashing, along with fine-tuning of low voltage electric systems, such as cameras, door access, and electronic signage.
2. Elementary School Safe Entrances: Our elementary school design team has commenced planning for "safe entrances" at both the elementary school and child care facilities. Ensuring the safety of our students and staff is a top priority.
3. Elementary School Theme: The elementary school's theme this year is "sports," emphasizing goal setting, teamwork, and overcoming obstacles. We are excited to see our young students embrace these values.

****Facility Health****

1. Middle School/High School Improvements: We have made significant improvements at the middle school/high school, including the removal of cast iron wastewater pipes, adding LED lighting throughout the building, secured entrances, up-graded electrical systems, central air conditioning with a new chiller, new emergency generators, and new heating boilers.
2. Elementary Upgrades: The planned upgrades for the Elementary School include LED lighting installation, HVAC system control upgrades, and secure entrance designs for both child care and elementary school.

****Financial Health****

1. Capital Referendum: We have allocated the bulk of the \$16 million dollar referendum for the middle school/high school classroom addition and full building renovation. Funds have been reserved for the elementary school, primarily for LED lights, HVAC controls, and secure entrances. We are exploring ways to ensure the security and growth capacity of both the child care and the elementary school within this plan.
2. Operating Referendum: Currently, we are in the fourth year of a five-year operating referendum. This allows us to allocate additional funds above the state's revenue limit cap, ranging from \$1 million to \$1.1 million each year. These funds are vital for staff salaries, benefits, and annual maintenance and supplies. In 2024, we will seek community support to renew this operating referendum, crucial for our district's financial stability.
3. Private School Vouchers: The Private School Voucher program is state mandated and requires a portion of your tax dollars to be allocated to private schools. These dollars are included in the school district taxes on your tax bill. The 2023-25 biennial budget has significantly increased public tax dollars for students enrolled in private schools, affecting our district's mill rate. It is important to note the School District of Oakfield does not receive these dollars from the community tax collection.

As your district administrator, I am proud of the progress we've made and the dedication of our staff, students, and community members. Together, we will continue to ensure the School District of Oakfield remains a place of growth, excellence, and safety for all, a place where "our roots run deep and our branches stretch far".

Coach Rickert

The 2023 season for the Oakfield Varsity Football Team is underway. The team started the year with a close victory at home against Wisconsin Heights on August 25th. The team then went on long trips the next two weeks with a 43-6 win at Wonewoc Center-Weston and at 53-0 win at Kickapoo. Oaks returned home on September 15th against Valley Christian (Oshkosh) in a battle of two teams that were 3-0. The Oaks took a strong 43-8 win.

The offense and the defense are both clicking and several players have registered stats in the top 10 of 8 player football in Wisconsin: Bailey Schepp for Quarterback rating, Mitchell Moser in receiving yards and punt returning, and Westin Bass for punting and extra point percentage. Hunter Sabel and Bailey Schepp are just out of the top 10 in total tackles.

The Oaks will return to the road for games at Menominee Indian and Williams Bay and finish up the year at home for Parent's Night on October 6 against Elkhart Lake and for Homecoming on October 13 against Abundant Life Christian School. Come root your Oaks on as they make a push for the playoffs.

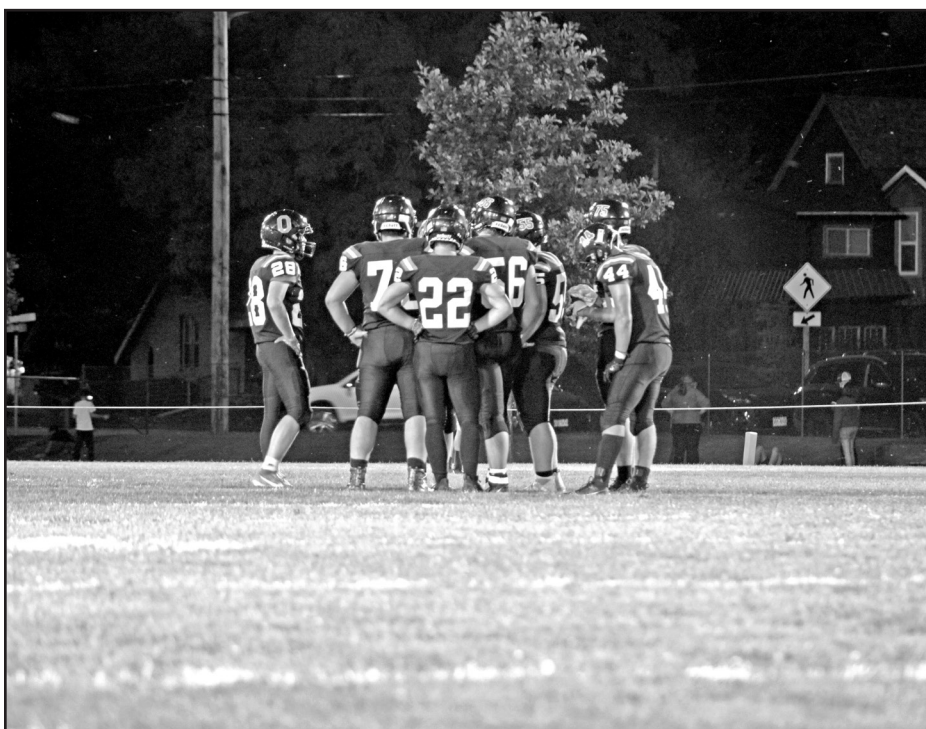

Isaac is a sixth grade student at Oakfield Middle School, and to celebrate Down syndrome awareness month, he wants to remind everyone the importance of inclusion and acceptance of all.

Here are some facts about Down syndrome from the National Down Syndrome Society:

- Down syndrome is named after John Langdon Down, the British physician who described the syndrome for the first time in 1866.
- Down syndrome occurs when an individual has a full or partial extra copy of chromosome 21, and is also referred to as Trisomy 21.
- Approximately one in every 772 babies in the United States is born with Down syndrome, making Down syndrome the most common chromosomal condition.
- Inclusions benefits everyone.
- Down syndrome results in hypotonia (lower muscle tone) which is why some things, such as, talking and walking take extra effort.
- People with Down syndrome are very loyal friends and just want to have fun like everyone else.

The Oakfield Lions Club Sponsored the recent Red Cross Blood Drive held Sept. 20 at the Oakfield Community Center.

We were fortunate to have collected 35 units of LIFE SAVING BLOOD, however, we are more than 10 units short of our goal for the year. To those who are able to step up and donate, please know that we appreciate the effort that you make. We recently have lost several of our dedicated donors because of medical reasons. Each and every unit is a gift. If you have ever experienced a loved one or a dear friend who is in need of a blood transfusion, you know how important this gift is. Here in Oakfield, we are blessed. The Red Cross does generously provides funds for scholarships. The amount of funds we receive depends on the total units we are able to collect over a 12 month period. We have 5 Blood Drives throughout the year, normally, Sept, December, March, May and July. We need your help. The following is a printout of the funds received from the Red Cross in past years and the students who received the scholarship money. With that, please realize that our staff of workers and our Lions Club Membership is becoming more aged and we need new members to serve. We welcome you to "Give Back and To Serve" this Oakfield Community. we are asking for an infusion of new members and new ideas.

Here is a run down on scholarships we've given out since 2013 when we gave out the first Red Cross scholarships. Every year we have been able to award a scholarship to each student who applied.

- 2013** Lions scholarships 2 for a total of \$800, the Kraft family gave the Lions \$400 to give out as a one-time scholarship, and we gave out 4 Red Cross scholarships for a total of \$1000
- 2014** Lions scholarships 3 for a total of \$1200
4 Red Cross scholarships for a total of \$1000
- 2015** Lions scholarships 4 for a total of \$1200
5 Red Cross scholarships for a total of \$100
- 2016** Lions scholarships 4 for a total of \$1400
3 Red Cross scholarships for a total of \$750
- 2017** Lions scholarships 5 at \$300, 1 at \$100 for a total of \$1600
- 2018** Lions Scholarships 2 at \$350 and 2 at \$325 for a total of \$1350
3 Red Cross scholarships for a total of \$750
- 2019** Lions scholarships 2 at \$400 and 3 at \$150 for a total of \$1250
Red Cross 3 for a total of \$750
- 2020** Only 2 girls applied that year so 1 got the Lions scholarship of \$750 and 1 got the Red Cross scholarship of \$750
- 2021** 1 Lions scholarship for \$1000 and 1 Red Cross for \$1000 and 2 Red Cross for \$750 each for a total of \$2500
- 2022** Lions Scholarships 3 at \$600 each and 1 at \$350 for a total of 2150 Red Cross 1 at \$250 3 Red Cross at \$750 for a total of \$2500
- 2023** Lions scholarships 3 for a total of \$2250 Red Cross 1 for \$1500 and 1 for \$1000

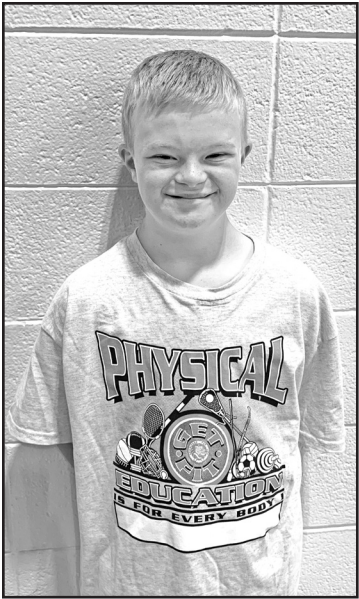

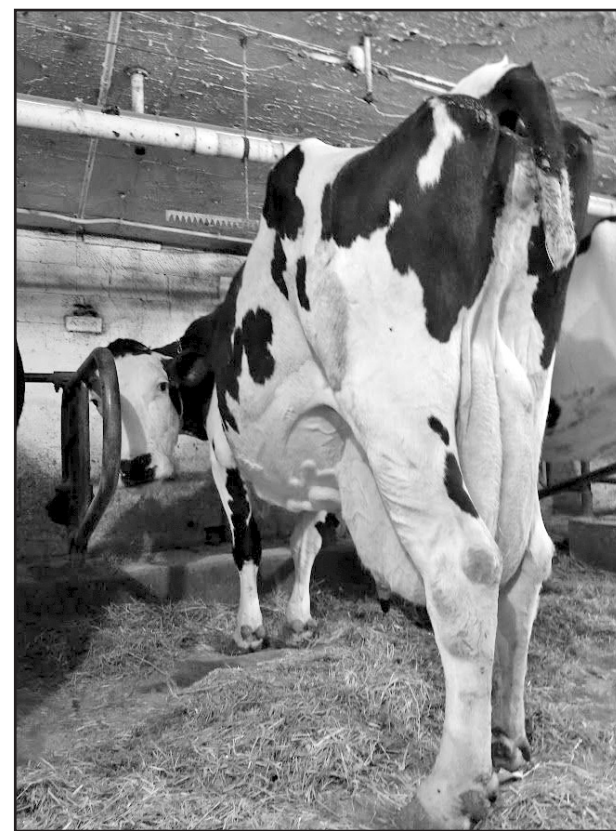

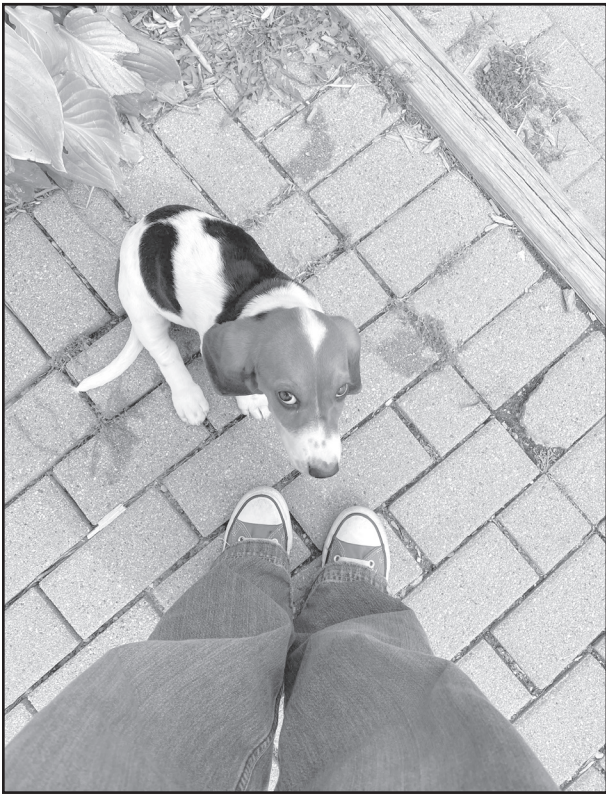
